UPDATE FROM PROCESS ENGINEERING

It's been a busy year for the Process Engineering department. In addition to the day to day challenges, we have been occupied with rearranging the shop floor after our building expansion to make things run more efficiently, and we are finally seeing the light at the end of the tunnel with this project. It has been kind of a juggling act trying to coordinate and with contractors and time things right so we didn't interrupt production too much. We are in the final stages of the Handcup Assembly setup which was the last department to move. This department saw some major changes in layout when they moved; going to a cellular type layout instead of the old assembly line that everyone was used too. There were multiple reasons for going to this type of setup, which I won't go into detail, but it was tested and proven to be on average 20% more efficient, which is a big deal when you consider how many handcups are built each year.

In order to support this new Handcup layout and add some capacity we got the go ahead to build 4 new leak testers. We have wanted to do a redesign on these for a while since some of the old ones are starting to wear out, break down more often, and the components are

which is a big deal when you consider how many handcups are built each year.

obsolete. Sam took on this project and built one first to test and work the bugs out and it is working great. The new design is more intuitive and easier to operate as well as more flexible with the type of products that can be tested on it. We took the input from operators about all the things that they didn't like and did like about the old ones and used that

info in the redesign. The final 3 new testers are currently being built and will be completed soon.

One of the highlights of this year for us has been the introduction of the Orbitform radial forming machine for joining our plungers together. We had been working with Orbitform for over a year off and on helping them develop this custom machine for us that has eliminated the need for brazing the brass tube to the steel endcap of our plungers. The brazing process was a dirty, time consuming, and expensive process due to the cost of the consumables that go into it. This new machine is very simple to run which simplifies training operators, and we have been able to cut down our batch sizes which makes scheduling easier and keeps the parts flowing steadily to HC assembly. The average cost of a plunger made in July of 2016 was \$1.74, compared to \$2.60 in July of 2015. That \$0.86 savings per part adds up to a \$79,120 savings over the course of a year as we are on track to make about 92,000 parts this year. Thank you to the operators who have been patient and worked with us getting the bugs sorted out with this new process!

ALEISA ABEL MAKES A NEW FRIEND

At break time one sunny morning, Aleisa Abel left the building to find a new friend just hanging around. On closer inspection, she discovered that it was an adolescent praying mantis. She

scurried to find something she could capture it in. Upon her return, she scooped up this little guy. She was kind of excited, as she had never seen a praying mantis in Montana before.

She had me run up to get my camera, and we shot a few photos before we let the little guy go out by the softball fields.

The praying mantis is kind of a novelty in Montana. Most that live here have been brought in by gardeners that use them for pest control. They prefer temperate and tropical climates, but they can be found in every state and on every continent on earth, except Antarctica. There are some 2300 different species worldwide.

Mantises have all the senses

that humans have – sight, smell, taste, feeling and hearing. Their senses are weak compared to us, but their eyesight is remarkable. They are equipped with stereo vision -- a rare trait in the insect



world, and they are one of just a few insects that can actually turn their head – some 300°. Mantises are voracious eaters and well equipped to hunt. Their eyesight is acute and they hunt during the day. Usually, they lay motionless and wait for their prey to wander by, although it is not above and beyond them to give chase to capture their prey.

Unlike most insects that sense

sound by vibration, a mantis can actually hear. The ear of a mantis is located in its abdomen and can only pick up the high frequency echo location sounds of bats. Seems that bats love to eat them while they are in flight. When

> a mantis hears the high pitched calls of a bat close by, it performs evasive maneuvers and drops to the ground to hide.

> While all mantises have wings, the female of the species does not fly (generally). She just hangs around giving off pheromones waiting for a boyfriend to catch a whiff

and come find her. The female lays clusters of dozens of eggs and then encases them in a kind of foam. The foam protects them from the elements and prevents them from drying out.

If this little mantis gets lucky, and we get lucky, maybe we'll find more little mantises wandering around the Powr-Grip plant in the future.

For our first issue, we talked Conway Hendrickson, a Draft Engineer here at Wood's Powr-Grip. He loves to fish. If you're the type of person who

doesn't ever seem

to catch anything, and thinks it's boring, then maybe you need to dig a little deeper into the craft. Conway has clearly thought this out: On his last fishing trip, he, his girlfriend, and his daughter caught 19 pike. In all, they brought home 98 lbs of pike fillets in just three days. Here are his top ten pike-fishing tips that will help you

1.) Find the perfect fishing hole.

Pike like it where bait fish live: they love to eat these small fish. Typically they spawn in still or gently flowing water with plenty of vegetation. "I went up to an area," Conway explains, "where there were these popple trees that grew when the water was low. When they let less water go from the dam, it flooded them.

3.) Bring chest waders.

Pike like still waters, which often tend to be broad and shallow. Sometimes the fish are near the shore. Sometimes they are further out. It just depends. You might not be catching anything from shore, and then, "You put waiters on and wade out there a ways and you start catching 18-20 pounders."

vou'll want it to around 6-1/2 feet long. You'll also need a medium reel and fishing line that is tested at 14

to 20 lbs. Conway recommends that you use an 18" steel leader so the pike don't bite through the line and make off with your hook. And speaking of


"Smaller hooks-they can flatten them with a single bite," warns Conway. He personally likes the "extended" treble hook you can find at Cabela's. It can make

so do dead minnows; pike are greedy eaters when putting on weight for spawning and afterwards, when they're trying to recover lost weight.

Smelt also works well, and in murky waters oils can help attract fish via the funky smells. "I mix the smelt with either some rotten shad oil, or anise oil or even some garlic oil in a Ziploc bag and throw it in the freezer. I usually make a variety," says Conway. He likes to make his a month ahead, giving it time to properly funkify.

6.) The right technique makes everything easier.

After you make your cast, set up your pole with a rod holder, and keep the bail open.

"I set the drag on reel ahead time; unless you're comfortable adjusting it while reeling a fish in, I just set it ahead of time and it's easier for

everyone. I was actually having more fun casting and setting lines up because I got to watch my girlfriend and daughter pull them in. They were really liking

When the fish bites, let it run out the line a ways before setting the hook. You may need to reel it in 3 or 4 times to tire it out before you can easily net it.

7.) Use a big net.

A big fish doesn't fit into a small net. Conway uses a net that's around 2 feet wide. Be sure to

net the fish from the front and not by its tail-end, or it may just swim away to some other lucky fisherman.

8.) Don't let it bite you.

Pike have big teeth, "...About a guarter-inch long. Just below the gums."

They also have gill rakers that can tear up your hands. Wear rubber

to skin them or they get kind of slimy. We were out fishing and a big storm blew in. I just put the fish in a tote with some ice and got in the trailer with the rest. The next day they were slimy and bent from the tote." Conway recommends you throw a fillet board in the back of your pickup, because you can then quickly process the fish all the way down into fillets, right there in the field. When the

fish aren't biting, get to work filleting. That way you avoid doing it all at once later on.

10.) Fish tails tell all.

Game Wardens insist that some skin remain so they can identify the fish you caught. The easiest way to deal with this requirement is to simply cut the tails off of the fish and keep them in a baggy.

dipped gloves and use a 16" long pair of needle-nose pliers to remove the hook. "When they flip their head, they can get you," says Conway with amusement, "I was stringing a fish though its gills, with my hand that didn't have the glove, and it flipped its head and got my thumb. So for the rest of the day I was walking around with duct tape on my thumb."

9.) Don't leave the fillet board at home.

"You don't want to wait too long

So now you've caught all your fish, and after the excitement of the day, you realize you're not entirely sure what you're going to do with 50-some pounds of pike fillet. Conway recommends frying them with a light breading of flour. Check out his killer recipe!

Fishing is a great hobby: You can play with it casually, or go as far down the rabbit hole as you want. But, like with any hobby, there are a few fairly cheap and easy things you can do that can yield big-exponentially big-results. We hope Conway's tips will help make your next pike fishing expedition is a huge success.

LEAN TRAINING

late June the Product Engineering department, along with several other people went through two days of training. The training covered a lot of topics, but in particular we looked at the process to make improvements in what we do. This is very much related to some of the LEAN training other departments have gotten. Out of that training we have initiated a few items to review for improvements. Some of them are very internal to the department workings, but a couple of the items are intended to more directly affect other departments.

We are currently taking a hard look at the ECN process. We have listed three potential issues to address.

- The length of time from when a change is requested by someone until the drawing is updated with the change.
- Lack of communication of changes and requests, that they are being worked on or that a change has occurred
- The prioritizing of changes, who's change gets done first, etc.

We are reviewing the process and plan on generating ideas for changes. As we look at changes, we will be involving more people to work out the details.

A second item is closely related. We are looking at increasing and enhancing communication with production. Carl is making the rounds to identify issues and solutions. We have already started having representatives from Product Engineering attending several production huddle meetings. If you have something you would product engineering to address or information from us, please let that representative know. If you don't have a product engineering representative and think it would be useful, let me know.

We have been making the best of working without Amanda's assistance for several weeks. We are looking forward to her return. We are thankful that Kelcie Wood has been taking care of some of the tasks that Amanda typically does.

As we move forward this year, we are preparing for the role-out of the new Intelli-Grip system.

New Product Development is the lead in developing the new vacuum control system, with a lot of assistance from the one-man department of Steve Strobel. Product Managers are working with them now and we are preparing to take it forward. Initial versions of the MTCL and the MRTALP8 have been built for the lease fleet. The next step is a few MRTA8's will be built to be taken to trade shows this fall. Then designs for the MRTA8, MRTALP8 and the MRT4 will be updated. Sales will begin to take orders for the new versions. We will be building components late this year and start shipping the new designs in January.

Trying to learn from the past, with this role-out, we are assigning new stock numbers for the new designs. That will allow sales to take orders for the current design and the future design and we will be able to build the various items and track what goes where. It also allows us to keep better records for supporting and repairing existing lifters while supplying new designs. With the new designs there will be new parts, new processes and new quality concerns.

THE #1 TIP FOR PLAYING BETTER POOL

Most of us have played a game of pool at some point in our lives. Perhaps it was a simple game at the local pub. Maybe it was on a friend's rig, down in a basement in his man cave. With hundreds of varieties of pool, it can be hard to break into as a full-on hobby.

DeBree, the Tom Quality Assurance Director here at Wood's Powr-Grip, has been playing league pool for 15 years now, but he's been playing the game recreationally for as long as he can remember. Despite his considerable experience with the game, Tom insists that, "It's an excuse to hang out with your buddies on Wednesday nights drink, eat, have a fun time. It's just an excuse to go do something." That's the core attraction of it for

The #1 Tip on How to Get Better at Pool. Tom started out playing pool casually. I asked how he got involved with league play, to which he simply said, "It was my brother's team; they lost a player, I got in." League play isn't just an excuse to get out of the house in the middle of the week, it's also an excuse to go to Vegas once a year for the pool National Championships, something that Tom plans to do around the release of this article.

There are two main ways to break into league play. One way is to visit their website, find a local Billiards Congress of America (BCA) Pool League, and use the contact information to try and sign up as a "sub," or substitute player (filling in when a regular can't make it to a match or practice). However, "If you are a sub, you're going to want to be ready," he says. "Most of the time they're going to be happy to get a player... but you're not good enough."

The other route to League play is to sign up with a group of friends. You'll need a bar to sponsor though, VOLL which can difficult be depending

on where you live. Tom says you can sometimes find a sponsor bar simply by talking with your local league president. They can usually find a willing sponsor bar with their connections.

That's the mechanics of it — the basic low-down on making your way into the billiards scene — but what really makes the experience is the people. "Find the right chemistry," Tomsays, "The season starts in October and goes to the end of March. That's a long time. You want to get along with them."

Are you competitive, or laid back? Do you like "pomp and circumstance" at your bar, or do you like cheap refreshments? Or maybe you prefer something in between? Find a league that fits you. Find a sponsor bar that fits you. Do that, and you'll have a lot more fun. "Have a good time, you're not a professional player so don't worry about it," Tom recommends.

Why does he recommend this? What are professional players and what makes them so rare? "Most people don't have the drive for it," he said. In addition to the time commitment, pros and aspiring pro players generally perform repetitive drills. "Repetitive" is the key word here — check out this link (http://billiards.colostate. edu/resources/progpract.pdf for a few examples. If that doesn't bother you, you might be on your



way to fame in Vegas. Just find a team with similar ambitions.

As for the most important tip in getting better at the game, it's simple...

#1 tip - Hit The Ball Right!

"The majority of pool is hitting the ball right," Tom remarks. "The cue should be level, and the ball hit as squarely as possible. Don't rock the stick. It's surprisingly easy to hit the ball wrong." Tom motions in a swinging motion with his arm, where the hand starts up high, swings low halfway through the stroke, and comes back up again at the end of the shot. It's a very natural looking motion. The kind of thing a person could be doing without even realizing it.

He continues, "Hit the ball straight with a follow through, or it will go off on an angle. The lack of follow through is surprisingly common." Some people stop the cue as soon as it hits the ball. Following through with the stroke makes for a smoother, more controlled shot: "Very similar to golf."

Following this tip will get you a long way, Toms assures; the rest is just practice and experience. So have fun, find your dream team, your dream bar, and get out this Wednesday night.

PLANNING A TRIP

There are now so many ways to plan trips and many logistics and questions that go into planning one. Jumping in the car and driving down the road can be fun, but it can also lead to sleeping in your car and many other headaches.

Making reservations at hotels can be far more complicated than who has the best price per room. Often time, especially in places like Las Vegas, the price of the room is just the beginning of the cost of your stay. Watch for hidden fees attached to the room. The fees are typically for the cost of Wi-Fi, use of the pool, or use of the gym. If you negotiate at the beginning of your stay, sometimes you can get away from those costs assuming you do not want to use those options. Another big consideration is if the hotel provides a free breakfast. If a room is \$20 more, but has a free breakfast, you could be better off financial taking the room that costs more. Then you need to consider location. What good is it if you are saving \$15 a night but your event is 20 miles away? You will spend far more getting to and from the event as well as the time wasted you could have used playing.

When it comes to flying it is a whole new ballgame. There are some free websites to get tickets as well as the ability to use the Wood's Powr-Grip site. If you use some of these free sites and there is a problem, you are going to wait on hold for a long time to get someone to help you. If you know how to use them, you probably will be all right, but if you do not know the ins and outs of flights, I do not suggest using them.

When choosing a flight, there are some things to consider along with the cost of the flight. Sometimes the options they show you will send you all over the country before you get to your location. Flying to Seattle to get

to New York might not be your best option. Also be careful about layovers. Some of the options will only give you a 30 minute layover between flights. This means your next flight is boarding before you get off the plane. If your plane is a little late or your flight is on the other side of the airport, you might not make it. This could result in a really long layover to get to your destination. In most airports I will not pick a flight that has any less than 45 minute layover, longer in some of the airports depending upon its size.

Now here is one that is often over looked. I am at my destination and need to get around. Some places have great public transportation and some, like where we are, do not have much of anything. Other options are to check to see if there is a free shuttle running from your hotel. Taxis, Uber and lift are another option. Or a rental car may be a choice. With a rental, be sure you are up to driving in the traffic of the city. I have driven all over but would not elect to drive in New York City, they have some funky local driving rules about running yellows that would get me in trouble.
