ACCOUNTING UPDATES

I'm not even sure where to begin on the past year from a financial standpoint – what a roller coaster it has been! The SBA PPP loan application was released the first week of April, and on April 9th, we were the first PPP loan to be granted

we had purchased in order to increase our sanitary measures.

Moving into the fall and winter months, we were up and running almost back to normal sales levels (about 90%). With sales picking up, we were able to place orders for a couple of large machines that we've been considering for a while now. This includes the new Emmegi CNC Sawing/Milling machine, as well as the new Preformer that is expected to arrive in a few weeks.

Lately, our biggest disruption has been our supply chain. Unfortunately, we've experienced delays with our incoming materials which as a result has caused our product to go out the door later than scheduled. Once the product goes out the door, we don't see the payment for another 30-60 days. And lately, it's been even longer. Some of our largest distributors have been paying us much past their due dates which is very uncharacteristic. This makes it hard to forecast our cash flow when distributors who used to

By the end of March - early April, we were deep into our Line of Credit, waiting on payment from customers who had completely shut down or had been in quarantine. But, we still had obligations to meet from our vendors as well as payroll for our employees.

MAKING THE CASE, FOR NEAR MISS REPORTING AND HAZARD ASSESSMENTS

"The Occupational Safety and Health Administration was established in 1971. Since that time, fatality and injury rates have dropped markedly. It is estimated that in 1970 around 14,000 workers were killed on the job. That number fell to approximately 4,340 in 2009. At the same time, U.S. employment had almost

we may find ourselves in virtually every day. Recognizing and minimizing these four states in order to thwart injury-causing mistakes, is key. If you recall, it is well documented that 99% of incidents, at work, are preventable.

At the *heart of prevention* is **Near Miss reporting** and **Hazard Assessments.** Near

doubled. Since the passage of the OSH Act, the rate of reported serious workplace injuries and illnesses has declined from 11 per 100 workers in 1972 to 3.6 per 100 workers in 2009 (BLS)."

Not only have we seen a noticeable decline in deaths, we have also witnessed a substantial decrease in the number of serious injuries since the safety and training guidelines have been realized. This was accomplished as the number of workers nearly doubled. Which proves that Safety is not merely 'common sense'. Although, there is a large component of human error associated with incidents; Fatigue, rushing, complacency, and frustration are conditions

Miss evaluations and Hazard Assessments can yield possible oversights in the 5 hierarchy of controls: eliminate, substitute, engineering controls, administrative controls, and PPE. If you want to report a near miss, tap inspections on a 5S tablet then locate the near miss tab (leave a? in place of your name, if you wish to remain anonymous). Kazz and I will automatically receive an email upon completion. Also, there is an orange folder at the Safety Station containing near miss forms. You are also welcome to report, any concerns, directly to the safety department as well. Reporting a Near Miss, or completing a Hazard Assessment may well avert a serious injury to a colleague, friend, or yourself.

VALUE STREAM MAPPING

KAZZ SIEWING, LEAN PROCESS ENGINEER

What is it?

 This tool helps to view an entireprocessinits current state and then envision an improved process, also known as, "material and information flow mapping".

Why it works

- Identifies the current and next constraint
- Visualizes single-process levels
- Identifies wastes
- Common language can be set
- Flow becomes apparent for discussion
- Lean concepts and techniques are used
- Is an implementation plan, like blueprints for a house
- Shows links to information and material flow
- Describes how to improve flow without looking at non-value-added steps

MOLDING AND PREP & FINISH

This past year we have had a lot of changes in Molding and Prep & Finish. At the beginning of 2020, the Molding Room got a new Cold Jet. This machine uses dry ice to blast

a good appearance. It is also used in Prep & Finish to blast off welding soot from tight spaces, allowing us to prep parts faster and easier for powder coating.

THIS ADDS UP TO AN EXTRA 320 PADS EVERY DAY

off the soot build up on molds caused by the mold release after continuous use. This has enabled us to keep molds in for a longer period, while still producing a pad that has The 8" pad design was changed to include a lip which allowed us to eliminate the slitting and felting process which took an average of 4 hours every shift to do. We also changed the

cycle time and temperature which saved an additional 15 minutes every hour. This has allowed us to increase the set count by 10 every shift, which adds up to an extra 320 pads every day.

With the recent addition of a new office, the Tumbling and Teardown Areas have gone through a Kaizen Event. Teardown and Tumbling were both reduced in size and rearranged. While a lot has been done already, please bear with us as we are still trying to figure out the final arrangement.


