WPG UPDATE

BRYAN WOOD, PRESIDENT & CEO

Here we are, winding down another year. How can that be? Letting go and turning the page always seems to come with some anxiety. This year is definitely no exception.

One thing that I wouldn't necessarily say is winding down. but it is a little softer this year than it was last year at this time is our order volume. There seem to be several factors influencing this. In the last newsletter I discussed the substantial drop in sales volume from our European customers. In past years we have received large restocking orders from some of our European distributors towards the end of the year. The volume of these orders continues to be down. It appears that the European economies, similar to the US economy, are struggling to resume the growth they

were experiencing prior to the pandemic.

In the US, and other developed economies, the impact of higher interest rates, work from

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home, and a few other side effects from the pandemic, are

having a negative effect on the commercial construction industry. Typically, commercial construction projects have a life cycle, consisting of planning, permitting and the construction phase, which can take a few years. When interest rates jumped up a couple of years ago it slowed the number of projects entering the pipeline. I believe we are starting to feel the effects of that now. Currently permitting rates continue to trend below what they were prior to the major rates increases in 2022. My crystal ball continues to be far less reliable than what I would like it to be. However, if I had to guess I would say that over the next several months we will continue to see steady order volume but at a lower rate than what we experienced in 2021-2023.

In early November Aegis displayed a the SEMA show in Las Vegas. SEMA stands for "Specialty Equipment Marketing Association", which basically includes anything and everything for the automotive aftermarket, including the tools that work on cars which is where we fit in.

It was a 4 day show with long hours, so we switched

METALCON

If you have ever heard of IMP (Insulated Metal Panel) lifters, you have probably been here long enough to be familiar with the MetalCon trade show. This year MetalCon was held in Atlanta, Georgia October 30-November 1.

After Glass Build America, the second largest show where we normally exhibit is called MetalCon. MetalCon is noticeably smaller than Glass Build and – this year – it was also significantly less busy.

The first day of the three-day show in Atlanta was OK, but the second day was noticeably slower. The second day also happened to be Halloween, which may have played a part in the low attendance, but the third day was slow.

Next year the show is moving from Atlanta to Las Vegas. For years the Glass Build show alternated between Atlanta and Las Vegas, so it is a little coincidental that the first two years it broke that pattern. MetalCon is in those two cities

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with Glass Build returning to Las Vegas in 2026.

GLASSTECH 2024

Traditionally, this has been an, "everything and anything to do with glass" show.

The semi-annual international glass show, Glasstech, was held in Dusseldorf Germany November 21-25 this year. I

attended with the intention to visit with international customers as well as see what is going on in the European Market. Nobody from Wood's Powr-Grip has attended the show since pre-COVID, so it was interesting to see how much had changed, and how much had stayed the same.

The first thing that caught my eye was that the visitor traffic did not seem to be as heavy as it was in the past, but was still a very busy show. The show has not noticeably shrunk in size. Traditionally, this has been an, "everything and anything to do with glass" show. This year the hall that is normally dedicated to decorative glass is now basically empty, and there was decorative stuff in the hall next to it. So maybe it is one hall smaller, but it still fills eight full halls (Note: for comparison, Metalcon or Glass Build, our biggest shows in the U.S., are typically just one or two halls in size.) and takes a full day to walk every isle.

The MRPT took a large amount of space in the booth as we hung it from a mini crane that was loaned to us by Smiley Cranes, one of our






























2025 HOLIDAY CLOSURE shutdown schedule

JAN 1 WEDNESDAY NEW YEARS DAY

APRIL 18 FRIDAY GOOD FRIDAY

MAY 26 MONDAY MEMORIAL DAY

JULY 4 FRIDAY INDEPENDENCE DAY

SEPT 1 MONDAY LABOR DAY

NOV 27-28 THURSDAY & FRIDAY THANKSGIVING

DEC 24, 2025 (WED) - JAN 2, 2026 (FRI) WINTER SHUTDOWN

Note: The last day of work before Winter Shutdown will be Tuesday, December 23, 2025.

Return to work on Monday, January 5, 2026.

HOLIDAY CLOSURES

If an employee is scheduled to work on a posted holiday, they will receive the day off and the paid holiday benefit for that day. If an employee is not scheduled to work on a posted holiday, they will not receive the paid holiday benefit.

All full-time employees who are employed as of January 1, 2025, and work the entire calendar year of 2025 will receive 80-hours of paid holiday for 2025. Reduced-hour full-time employees, regular part time employees, and employees who have not worked the entire year, will receive a proportional number of holiday hours based on their scheduled work hours in 2025.

WINTER SHUTDOWN

The number of paid holiday hours an employee will receive during the winter shutdown will be determined by the number of paid holiday hours they received prior to the shutdown. Each employee will be paid the balance of any eligible hours of paid holiday remaining for the year, during the shutdown, taking into account their full-time, reduced full-time, or proportional part-time status.

Vacation or Personal Leave may be used to cover any non-paid days/hours during the winter shutdown. Employees who do not have sufficient paid leave must take the remaining days/hours as approved time without pay.
